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The Mayor's Anvil: Forging Understanding By Mayor Fordyce Beals

Mayors Anvil: Battle of New Orleans-The first large battle between the smooth bore musket and the rifle

In the Battle of New Orleans, January 8, 1815, the American troops were estimated by their leader, General Andrew Jackson, to total about 4,000 men. Of these about 300 were negroes, mostly without firearms of any kind; about 600 were La Fitte's pirates, armed with cutlasses and pistols; part of them served the 13 cannon and the rest were for hand-to-hand fighting in case the enemy scaled the breastworks: their influence upon the battle was very small: there were about 500 regulars armed with muskets; at close range they counted for something; and then there were about 500 regulars armed with Model 1803 Rifles, and about 2,100 militia from Kentucky, Tennessee and Louisiana who were the deadly units in that little army., Marine detachments were holding the center of General Andrew Jackson's defensive line, in the final major battle and one of the most one-sided engagements of the war.

The most widely used weapon in the War of 1812 was the smoothbore musket, which was carried by most of both sides' infantrymen in the field. These had an effective battlefield range of 50-100 yards, necessitating close assaults and bayonet tactics be employed. There were also some units equipped with rifles, which were used primarily as light or specialized infantry. The Model 1803 was considered accurate up to 150 yards, but a well-trained marksman could expect to hit a target at 200 yards.

General Jackson's opponent was Lieutenant General Sir Edward Pakenham, a respected veteran of the Peninsular War and the brother-in-law of the Duke of Wellington; his force was estimated to be about 10,000, veterans of many battles and some Royal Marines. General Packenham did the attacking; General Jackson's riflemen did the shooting that counted; in about three hours the battle was all over except for burying the dead. General Jackson reported that he had lost 6 men killed and 7 wounded. General Packenham couldn't report, Pakenham and his entourage were killed by a blast of grapeshot. His successor reported the loss of 2,100 men killed and wounded, including three generals and seven colonels.

The War of 1812 is important to United States history because it was viewed as a victory over Great Britain. It reaffirmed America's independence, ushered in the "Era of Good Feelings," and started the expansion of the United States past the Louisiana Territory. The war also marked the rise of men like William Henry Harrison, Andrew Jackson, Henry Clay, and John C. Calhoun, who would play important roles in shaping the trajectory of the United States leading up to the Civil War.

It was the first large battle between the smooth bore on the British side and the rifle on the American side. Europe was amazed at the U.S. dominance.

Napoleon, in exile upon Elba, refused to credit the report. The rifle, in flintlock and in percussion lock, from its infancy about 1750 until the time when the muzzle loader was superseded by the breech loader — and that was more than a century later — was ever true to type. No better all-purpose weapon was ever devised for conditions as they used to be.





In the early 19th century, Harpers Ferry began production of the Model 1803 flintlock rifle. These distinctive arms, with their Kentucky styling and half fore stock, are considered by some to the most beautiful rifles ever produced by the United States government. The Model 1803 was a flintlock and fired a .54 Caliber round out of a 33-inch barrel. However, unlike a musket, which contains a smoothbore barrel, a rifle contains grooves inside the barrel that causes the bullet to spin through the air, making for a higher velocity gun with longer range and increased accuracy. As a result, riflemen armed with the Model 1803 could have a 50 to 100 yards advantage against an enemy armed with muskets. The downside of the Model 1803 is that it only fired 1-2 shots per minute, while the musket could fire 2-3 shots per minute. In retrospect, the Harper's Ferry Rifle signifies a turning point in American military history, marking the transition from reliance on foreign-made firearms to domestic production and the dawn of advanced manufacturing techniques. While it may not have seen extensive use or had the longevity of some other firearms, its influence on American and international firearm design and manufacturing cannot be overstated.

Steel pistol caliber ammunition is A-OK! If you aren't shooting rifles, we don't need to check what you're shooting. If you have any other questions or concerns, feel free to contact us and ask!

Territorial Governor's News:

There was a meeting of the SASS Territorial Governors at the California State Championships last month. I attended on behalf of 5 Dogs. There are three items to report.

1. Smoke Factor. Ever since the creation of the Black Powder categories, there have been complaints about "gamers" shooting in the special categories but using ammunition that does not generate enough smoke to impair the shooter. It was reported that this issue was discussed at the End of Trail (EOT) Territorial Governors' meeting. A volunteer reportedly agreed to attempt to study smoke generation in the effort to develop an enforceable "smoke factor" standard along the lines of the previously enacted (but rarely enforced) power factor.

The California TGs agreed that there was nothing to do unless and until the volunteer reports his results. Even then, there is real skepticism that smoke can be adequately and consistently measured across various calibers and types of ammunition in various regions and in diverse weather conditions. Perhaps the volunteer will impress us all with his results, but until then, it seems unlikely that new "smoke factor" rules are going to come into being.

This is a non-problem with 5 Dogs. Our black powder shooters embrace the Dark Side fully and smoke up the stage with vigor. Locally at least, this ain't broke and does not need to be fixed.

2. 1873 Winchester in B-Western. A particular TG from Southern California consumed much of this meeting (at he did with the Regional Meeting last August) with a lonely crusade for a rule-change allowing the use of the 1873 Winchester lever-action rifle in the B-Western category. He argued that "tricked-out" 1973s now dominate competition among the top shooters, placing top shooters electing B-Western at an unfair disadvantage. He also pointed out that many film characters whose costumes were consistent with our B-Western category were portrayed using the 1873 rifle. It appears that a substantial majority were unpersuaded. Most TGs appeared comfortable with the division of historic rifles between Classic Cowboy and B-Western and are hostile to rule changes focused only perceived competition issues among a tiny minority of shooters.

Last August, the Western Regional TGs adopted a motion to ask SASS to consider the issue. That motion appears to have been ignored. In this meeting, the TGs passed a motion asking SASS to state the original basis for excluding the 1873 from B-Western. That may get ignored as well.

Again, this is not a local problem. Classic Cowboy and B-Western participation at 5 Dogs is minimal, with one or both of the "costume categories" usually going begging. The warm consequences of full costumes at 5 Dogs in the summertime probably has much more to do with participation levels than the status of the 1873 Winchester rifle.

3. Mild Bunch: Last November, SASS liberalized the rules for "Wild Bunch" side matches and distinct Wild Bunch main matches. The hope that Wild Bunch Action Shooting (WBAS) would become a separate and strong shooting discipline drawing participation from outside Cowboy Action Shooting has faded away. To its credit, SASS has graciously accepted this reality. The use of shotguns other than the 1897 Winchester and Winchester 12 have been legalized with "stoking" at the loading table dependent on the shotgun being used. Rifles chambered in calibers less than .40 are now permitted in State and Above matches. Shooters are still free to comply with the "original" rules. Local clubs are no longer being asked to appoint a separate Territorial Governor (called "ambassadors") for Wild Bunch. Until otherwise instructed, I will continue to serve as the TG for 5 Dogs, including being "ambassador" for Wild Bunch.

Separate Range Officer/Timer Officer training and qualification for Wild Bunch continues to exist.

I hope this report is helpful. Thank you for the honor of serving our club as Territorial Governor.


