## The Mayor's Anvil: Forging Understanding By Mayor Fordyce Beals



Annie Oakley's Remington Beals .32 caliber single shot rifle.

Sold for \$5 by a relative in 1940, this rifle was once owned by noted sharpshooter Annie Oakley. Fewer than 800 of these rifles are known to have been manufactured between 1866 and 1868. This is the only known factory-engraved example.

The design was covered by three patents assigned to Fordyce Beals, Remington's firearms designer, in 1864-66. When the lever is lowered, the barrel slides forward to expose the breech end. Their lack of popularity in the period likely stems from the rather weak cartridges, only suitable for small game and short ranges, and the fact that breech loaders were still received with skepticism despite what are now seen as obvious advantages. It has a dovetailed front sight, adjustable folding rear leaf sight, "BEALS PATENT JUNE 28, 1864, JAN. 30, 1866/E. REMINTON & SONS, ILION, NEW YORK." marked on the top of the barrel behind the rear sight, iron frame, and finely varnished buttstock with crescent buttplate.

Annie Oakley was born Phoebe Ann Moses on August 13, 1860, in Darke County, Ohio. When Annie was five, her father died, and Annie's mother, Susan Wise Moses, worked long and hard at nursing to support her six children. The family seldom had meat for dinner until 1867, when Annie taught herself to shoot the family muzzle loader. Soon afterward, Annie started bringing home rabbits, squirrels and grouse. She became such an accomplished hunter that she began selling game to local merchants. One of Annie's customers, Cincinnati hotel keeper Jack Frost, persuaded her to compete in a live bird trap shoot with the famous shooter, Frank Butler. Annie won the shoot, killing 25 birds to Butler's 24. A year later, in 1876, Butler returned to Ohio and asked Susan Moses for her daughter's hand in marriage. Annie and Frank spent most of their 50 years of married life exhibiting her skill for audiences in North America and Europe. They worked at a variety of entertainment venues, including circuses and vaudeville shows, but perhaps the couples' most famous engagement was with Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show, where they performed for 17 years.

During this period, she earned the nickname, "Little Miss Sure Shot" from fellow show performer and famed Lakota Sioux war chief, Sitting Bull. And though partially paralyzed after an accident in 1901, she continued to set shooting records and dazzle crowds for many years. Annie Oakley died in Greenville, Ohio on November 3, 1926.






# Some Sad Trail News

# RANGE WRANGLER NEWS




## Utah Blaine




