The Mayor's Anvil: Forging Understanding By Mayor Fordyce Beals

<u>Issues surrounding an unfired round</u> in a revolver at the unloading table

First: the unfired round is scored as a miss unless it is under the hammer, then it is a stage D. Q. Calling the Stage Disqualification requires that the unloading monitor knows that he/she is looking for the location of the unfired round before the unloading process is started. There are several methods that could establish that the unfired round is under the hammer but is not very likely that the unloading table operator will be able to say without any doubt that a Stage D. Q. is indicated. Any doubt requires no call be made.

<u>Second</u>: because the rules say that a miss cannot cause a procedural penalty (double jeopardy) it is often incorrectly said no procedural should be called if an unfired round is found in a revolver. For no procedural to be called the target engagement order must have been followed. If the targets were engaged in the correct order no procedural can be

called. Engaged means that the target is aimed at, and the hammer must be dropped even if the round does not fire, and the shooter continues in the correct target order. No procedural is earned in this case.

<u>Third</u>: If no target engagement was made and the unfired round was never under the cocked hammer and the trigger not pulled for that unfired round, a procedural is earned. In this case the target order is missing one round fired or engaged and the unfired round is scored as a miss and a procedural.

These calls require the counters and the unloading table operator to be competent in the execution of their jobs and without doubt, so the correct call is made. For more information go to:



Paniolo History

(Edited from an article in the "Santa Barabra Independent"

"Holo Holo" in Hawaiian, means to get around and ride and that's what Hawaiian Cowboys do. It all started in 1833 when King Kamehameha recruited three vaqueros from Alta, California to train the Hawaiians how to ride, rope and catch the wild cattle. These island Cowboys learned the basics from the California Vaqueros, but they added something of their own indomitable spirit and unmatched bravery.

Think Hawaii surfing, sand, sun, hula, and pineapples, right? Better add cowboys to that island mix, because the 50th state is home to one of the proudest horse-riding and cattle-corralling cultures in the world, a ropin' wranglin' tradition that harkens back to the 1800s and persists today on some of the largest ranches in the United States. So where did these Hawaiian cowboys, or paniolos, as they are re-known, learn the trade? From Central California's vaqueros, of course, the stylish and skilled horsemen who've influenced ranch hands across the world.

Molokai is the most Hawaiian of them all, Maui's cowboys are working toward organic, grassfed beef and enticing the island community to support their efforts in hopes of saving their tradition for future generations. On Kuai the paniolo tradition is undergoing rebirth because old sugar plantations are becoming rangeland. But the most vibrant community remains on the Big Island, where three vaqueros from Monterey came to teach the Hawaiians how to round up their cattle and turn them into a reliable food source. Despite their own historical strides, like the jaw-dropping 1908 mainland rodeo win by legendary Hawaiian horseman Ikura Purdy, the paniolos still relish their origins. The saddle is an evolved vaquero seat, made to go into water more easily; the slack key guitar tradition is a remnant of the vaqueros' leftover Spanish guitars; and even the word paniolo is a bastardization of Espanol.

A lot of people think that the cowboy is dead and gone, but far from it. The cowboy is alive today. It's still going forward, and a lot of young people are coming into it. The younger Hawaiians are enamored of the country life, one that keeps them close to their land and reinforces traditional ways. It's a way of living that many lost in the big city's hurried pace sure could learn a lot from.






DON'T MISS THIS!

July 17, 1881 Frontiersman Jim Bridger died: Jim Bridger was one of the most able and influential mountain men. The words on his large headstone summarize his life: "Celebrated as a hunter, trapper, fur trader and guide. Discovered the Great Salt Lake 1824, The South Pass 1827, visited Yellowstone Park and geysers 1830, founded Fort Bridger 1838, opened Overland Route by Bridger's Pass to Great Salt Lake. Was Guide for U.S. exploring expeditions, Albert Sidney Johnston's army in 1857 and G. M Dodge in Union Pacific survey's and Indian campaigns 1853 - 1865." Later Jim purchased a farm near Westport, Missouri, but soon became ill and blind. Jim was born 17 March 1804. Jim Bridger is buried in the Mount Washington Cemetery in Independence, Missouri. TL
