The Mayor's Anvil: Forging Understanding By Mayor Fordyce Beals

Instant Communications Coast to Coast Achieved In 1861

On July 4, 1861, work began on the transcontinental telegraph. The first transcontinental telegraph line construction was completed on October 24, 1861, which connected Omaha, Nebraska, to Carson City, Nevada, via Salt Lake City, Utah, following the route of the Oregon-California trail, allowing for near-instantaneous communication across the country. This development marked a significant milestone in electrical engineering and communication history.

In 1861, Benjamin Tyler Henry had perfected the 1860 Henry lever action rifle, but the Colt 1873 Single Action Army revolver was over a decade in the future.

James Gamble, an experienced telegraph builder in California, was put in charge of the western crew, and Edward Creighton was responsible for the eastern crew. From Salt Lake City, a crew in charge of James Street advanced westward, and W.H. Stebbins's crew eastward towards Fort Kearny. When the project was completed in October 1861, they had planted 27,500 poles holding 2,000 miles of single-strand iron wire over a terrain that was not always inviting

California Chief Justice Stephen Field sent one of the first messages from San Francisco to Abraham Lincoln, using the occasion to assure the president of California's allegiance to the Union (sent at 7:40 PM on October 24 and was received by President Lincoln at 11:30 the following morning):

TO ABRAHAM LINCOLN, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES: IN THE TEMPORARY ABSENSE OF THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE I AM REQUESTED TO SEND YOU THE FIRST MESSAGE WHICH WILL BE TRANSMITTED OVER THE WIRES OF THE TELEGRAPH LINE WHICH CONNECTS THE PACIFIC WITH THE ATLANTIC STATES. THE PEOPLE OF CALIFORNIA DESIRE TO CONGRATULATE YOU UPON THE COMPLETION OF THE GREAT WORK.

THEY BELIEVE THAT IT WILL BE THE MEANS OF STRENGTHENING THE ATTACHMENT WHICH BINDS BOTH THE EAST AND THE WEST TO THE UNION, AND THEY DESIRE IN THIS-THE FIRST MESSAGE ACROSS THE CONTINENT-TO EXPRESS THEIR LOYALTY TO THE UNION AND THEIR DETERMINATION TO STAND BY ITS GOVERNMENT ON THIS ITS DAY OF TRIAL. THEY REGARD THAT GOVERNMENT WITH AFFECTION AND WILL ADHERE TO IT UNDER ALL FORTUNES. STEPHEN J. FIELD

The construction coincided with Civil War combat to the southeast. The entire cost of the system was half a million dollars (equivalent to \$19 million in 2025).

The telegraph line immediately made the Pony Express obsolete, which officially ceased operations two days later. The overland telegraph line was operated until the transcontinental railroad was completed, on May 10, 1869

The lines of the California State Telegraph Company had already been extended as far as Virginia City after the consolidation of the lines, and it was decided that the work of extending the overland telegraph was to commence at Carson City. Part of the wire and insulators had in the meantime been ordered from the East and were shipped round by Cape Horn. The next most important item of material was the poles. These had to be hauled on wagons and distributed along the route from Carson City to Salt Lake.

The line was strung up at the rate of from three to eight miles a day. An advance telegraph station was kept up with the head of the line, and the progress of the work reported each day.

Construction details:

The wire was made from pure Swedish charcoal iron and was galvanized to protect it from rust. The most usual sizes are No. 9, weighing 323 lbs. to the mile, and No. 8, weighing 389 lbs. to the mile. (roughly 5/32-inch diameter) In jointing, the end of each wire is closely turned around the other four or five times and then cut off short. The joint is finished by dipping in melted solder.

Poles - Timber is used for poles. Chestnut, white and red cedar, and redwood are chiefly utilized. Poles are seldom less than 26 ft. long by 6 in. in diameter at the top.

Insulators - Iron holders embedded in glass and enclosed in wooden forms, kept the wires off the ground.

Batteries, needed to power the signal, were shipped as powder in containers with electrodes. Water was added later to bring the batteries to charge. Racks of Daniell cells or gravity cells would comprise a main line terminal telegraph battery. About one hundred cells would be all connected in series.

The transcontinental telegraph utilized relay stations every twenty miles. Often signals received over long lines were too weak to operate the receiving instruments directly so the relay station served as an extremely sensitive switch to connect a local battery to the receiving instruments. Thus, it could take multiple operators several hours for the message to go coast to coast.

The following quote by James Gamble forged understanding for Fordyce: containing what still makes America great - A new idea implemented that improves Americans lives, makes a profit, and results in pride of accomplishment:

"Probably no line of the same length in the world made so much money as the old California State Telegraph Company, nor was any line of so much practical utility as the first wire stretched across the continent. I had the honor to assist in the making of both."......James Gamble

"TIMER OPERATOR"



TO - The role of the Timer Operator (TO) is to safely assist the shooter through the course of fire. Coaching and constraining the shooter from unsafe acts are expected when appropriate, minimizing procedural and safety penalties whenever possible. Proper coaching or no coaching at all is NOT considered RO interference and will never be grounds for a re-shoot. Failure to stage firearms or ammunition at the designated position(s)/location(s) is the fault of the competitor and scored as a procedural unless the competitor can correct the situation unassisted, while in the process of completing the stage under time. The penalty of using "illegally acquired" ammunition (i.e., NOT carried to the line/staged by the shooter in an approved manner) is a PROCEDURAL. Any targets hit using that ammo are scored as MISSES. NO adjustments will be made to the stage raw time. It is expected the Timer Operator will be the responsible party for resolving all safety related matters occurring in the loading, unloading, and firing line areas. However, as all shooters are considered Safety Officers, any shooter who observes a safety infraction not witnessed by the TO should call the infraction to a TO's attention, at which time the matter will be resolved.

Range Commands Standard Range Commands are the most efficient way to run a shooting line and are used in almost every established shooting sport. As a matter of safety, all shooters are required to obey all range commands given by the TO. For a more in-depth understanding of range commands, schedule your SASS RO 1 Course today.

IMPORTANT COMMON RANGE COMMANDS -

"Cease Fire!" or "STOP!" - The command called out by the TO or any witnessing Range Officer/Match Official at any time an unsafe condition develops. The shooter must stop shooting and stop moving immediately. Willful failure to comply to a Cease Fire or Stop command given by, and while under the control of the TO will result in a Match Disqualification penalty assessment.

"Muzzle!" - This command quickly and efficiently warns the shooter their muzzle is getting close to the 170° and should be pointed in a safe direction (back down range). -

"Down Range!" - This command is announced prior to anyone proceeding down range for any reason, including to reset or repair targets. When a "Down Range" command is announced, all participants at both the loading and unloading areas should cease firearm loading/unloading. Common practice is to raise hands in the air as a visual confirmation that no firearms are being handled while someone is down range. (This applies primarily when the loading tables and/or the unloading tables are oriented facing down range.)


